Lost at Sea David Boyle,2016-05-06 We returned to our loved ones, but we were never the same again. Most were markedly changed. Young boys had become mature older men, aged beyond their years. All because of those days in the sea. For five days near the end of the Second World War, the USS Indianapolis disappeared from the map.
