Defoe considered the accounts reliable because most of our Relators have not only given us their Names, and sign'd the Accounts they have sent, but have also given us Leave to hand their Names down to Posterity. The Storm has thus been called the first substantial work of modern journalism.

This is not, however, simply another dull record of combat losses and claims, far from it.
